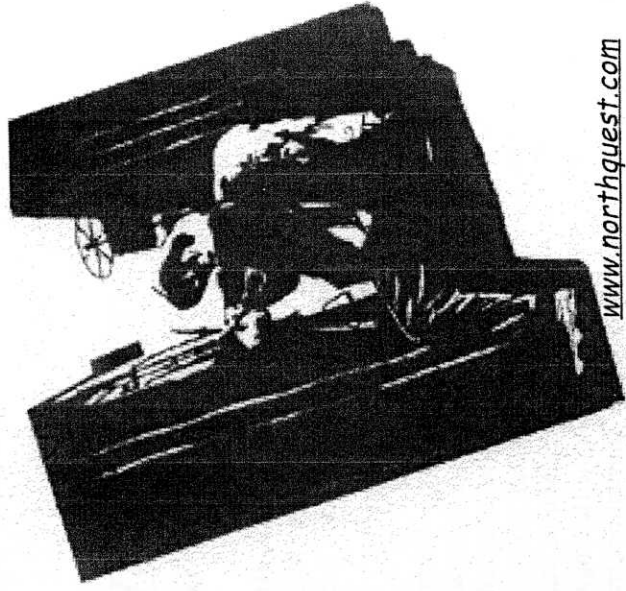


About our speakers:

Nicholas Delbanco is the author of some twenty books of fiction and non-fiction. His most recent novel (Warner Books, 2000) is *What Remains*, and his most recent work of journalism is (Verso Books, 2001) *The Countess of Stanlein Resorted: A History of the Ex-Paganini Stradivarius Violoncello of 1707*. A teaching text titled *The Sincerest Form* will be published by McGraw-Hill this fall. Delbanco directs the prestigious Hopwood Awards program at the University of Michigan, where he is the Robert Frost Collegiate Professor of English. He is the winner of the J.S. Guggenheim Memorial Fellowship, and twice, the National Endowment for the Arts Creative Writing Fellowship. He is this year's Michigan Author of the Year.

Morris Buske was founding chairman of the Ernest Hemingway Foundation of Oak Park. A retired educator, he spent much of his career at Oak Park High School which was attended by an illustrious alumnus, Ernest Hemingway. Buske was the keynote speaker for Oak Park's village centennial in 2002, "Oak Park Religion and Hemingway."

Jack Jobst and Ken Marek teach writing and literature (NMU, NMC). Long-time board members of MHS, they are avid readers and tireless researchers whose work has helped illuminate Hemingway's experience of Michigan in many different venues.

MHS, CMU library sponsor exhibition: "Hemingway in Michigan, Michigan in Hemingway"

The Clarke Library's Francis and Mary Lois Molson Gallery at Central Michigan University this fall features an exhibit devoted to Ernest Hemingway, one of the 20th Century's most influential and charismatic writers. The exhibit has been underwritten and advised in part by the Michigan Hemingway Society.

"Hemingway in Michigan: Michigan in Hemingway" will focus on the author's youthful experiences in northern Michigan, and the ways in which they continued to influence him throughout a career that took him to Europe, Africa, and the Caribbean.

During the winters Ernest Hemingway's family lived in the affluent suburb of Oak Park, Illinois, but their summers were spent at a cottage on Walloon Lake, near Petoskey. The young Hemingway filled these summers with explorations of the surrounding forests, streams, lakes, and villages, absorbing the unique texture of what Michiganians still refer to as "up north." He hunted, fished, tramped the woods and hiked along the railroad tracks, taking in the details of people and places that he would draw upon later in his Nick Adams Stories.

Highlights of the exhibit are rare photographs of the youthful Hemingway; family mementos, including an invitation to the wedding of Hemingway and his first wife, Hadley Richardson; first editions of Hemingway's Michigan-related novels and short stories; and memorabilia from the filmed versions of some of his works.

The text of the exhibit will explore the relationship between writer, landscape, and people, through period and modern photographs and maps, as well as written excerpts.

The exhibit will be open from October 7 through Dec. 15, Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.
