2008 Weekend Highlights

From the reception on Friday night to the Sunday morning goodbye's "Hemingway and Friends" was a memorable weekend. Valerie Hemingway's presentation on Friday evening delighted us with warm, personal reminiscences of Ernest's interactions with many of his friends. She emphasized how much these friendships meant to Hemingway, even though he occasionally behaved to the contrary with some people. Still, the loyalty, curiosity, sense of humor and strength of personality exhibited during the time she knew him all contributed to the humanity of this great man.

Saturday morning's discussions of "Light of the World", "Summer People" and "The Three Day Blow" by board members Jack Jobst, Charlotte Ponder and Fred Svoboda gave everyone new insights into those short stories from The Nick Adams Stories.

Saturday afternoon provided everyone with several options. The first was a tour of some Hemingway sites, led by the older, bearded EH, and played by Bill Nicholson. He reminisced about his years in Petoskey and we were in-

troduced to several friends and contacts from those days. Mrs. Potter, Margery Bump, Prudence Boulton and Bill Smith all "appeared" and spoke of their associations with him. City Park Grill, the Library, the High School, Marjorie's house and some other spots in Petoskey were all pointed out. Chris Struble, who "was" Bill Smith, talked about other friends and contacts when we stopped in the Horton Bay Area. Michelle Hill, the director of the Little Traverse Area Historical Society, gave everyone the opportunity to see the improvements in the museum. We enjoyed a box lunch in the chilly outdoors at the park at the foot of Resort Pike Road, very near where John Bacon's landing was located. It was a fun trip, and the motor coach was luxurious - a bit different from the school bus tours we've had the past few years.

We began with a tribute to Frank Hursley, a former MHS Board member who died this past year. His wife, Lois, four of his children, and several close friends were at the Hursley table. His son Duncan reminisced about his father and read an article about Hemingway sites that Frank had written in 1994 for the "Flyfishers Journal". We were all presented with a

After dinner we were delighted to hear from Paul Hendrickson speaking on Hemingway and boats, particularly focusing on a boat and camping trip in the Chicago area on the Des Planes River EH made as a young man with some of his high school friends. Paul teaches nonfiction writing at the University of Pennsylvania, and is in the process of writing a book on Hemingway and the Pilar.

Sunday morning after the breakfast buffet we were treated to a presentation by Ken Marek on Hemingway's friends, featuring a power point collection of pictures by Mike Federspiel. Ken's research always reveals some new insights into EH's life. And we heard from Henriette Kaplan, Irene Gordon's daughter, and

The Passing of a Selfless Woman



meanor nor her conversation, Kay had battled cancer off and on for several years, undergoing course after course of grueling treatment. Not until the final three months of her life did Kay give up her active duties as treasurer of the Michigan Hemingway Society and as volunteer to other organizations in her home town of Mt. Pleasant, Michigan.

Kay was a successful business woman and a professional writer who selflessly donated her time and talents in public relations and fund-

raising to numerous charities and interest groups. At the time of her death she was still serving on some seven boards, and, over the years, at least twenty-five others have benefited from her dedication and her brilliant creativity. Her love of community was all-encompassing: she broke ground as the first woman president of the Mecosta County Area Chamber of Commerce, served as advisor for Junior Achievement for the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe, chaired the Martin Luther King Jr. day committee, was a founding member of the county League of Women voters, and raised untold amounts of money for area hospitals and other medical facilities so that treatment would be available to all. As an ending most appropriate, Kay spent her final days in the brand new hospice facility

which owes its existence to her ideas and hard work.

Despite all these activities, whenever Kay was needed by her family because of illness, hardship, or celebration, everything else would be put on hold to tend to their needs. She was an example to us all of strength and the famous "grace under pressure" about which Hemingway wrote. We knew her during the years of her worst hardships and yet never heard a complaint from her. Kay was a loyal friend and a loving and giving mother and grandmother who will be missed by her children, Mark, Mary Beth, and Angela and their families. Our thoughts and prayers are with them always, for we loved their mother, too.

We dedicate our 2009 conference to the memory of Kay Smith.

- ••• "We truly enjoyed the Hemingway weekend. So fun and informative and just great people."


New Membership Levels and Fees For MHS

Next Year's Conference October 16-18, 2009

The 2009 fall conference will take place at the Odawa Hotel in Petoskey on October 16-18. Because the Perry Hotel is not available at all in October next year the Board surveyed other possible sites. In selecting the Odawa Hotel the Board

is attempting to hold down the conference cost for our 2009 participants. We were there in 2007 and appreciated their spacious rooms, their service, and the availability of their shuttle bus to downtown Petoskey. The theme for next year

will be "Hemingway and Art", so we hope that everyone will mark their calendars now for our next conference.

MHS Bids on 2012 International Conference

At the October conference the Michigan Hemingway Society Board agreed to submit a formal proposal to host the 2012 the Hemingway Foundation and Society International Conference. The proposal, which resulted from a two year discussion about the feasibility of holding the conference in northern

Michigan, was due by the end of 2008 and has been sent to the International Board.

Because the biennial conferences alternate between sites in America and foreign countries, 2012 is the earliest possible date for the MHS sponsorship. The 2010 conference will be held in

Lausanne, Switzerland.
